
Early Years Foundation Stage Our topic this half term has been 'Growing'. We have



planted fruit and vegetables in our outdoor area and learned how to help them grow. We wrote labels to identify what we had planted and made a scarecrow so the birds wouldn't eat our seeds. Each week we have shared a book and written sentences about the events in the story. We are now composing our



have improved giving them directions to move from flower to flower.






with them. We will be using digital mapping to track earthquake and volcano activity across the world, as well as locating them

We will create some initial batches of the sausage rolls to see how successful they are before modifying and improving the recipes in order to sell them on our Garden Party stall for you all to try. Year 4 children will also be performing their class assemblies this half term, which we are hope you will enjoy watching Our recommended read for this half term is Bill's New Frock by Anne Fine. Have you ever wondered what it would be like to wake up as someone

else? That's exactly what happens to Bill Simpson in this fun and surprising story.



One morning, Bill wakes up and finds out he's a girl, and he has to go to school wearing a pink dress! At first, he thinks it's a joke, but as the day

goes on, Bill starts to notice that people treat him very differently just because they think he's a girl. He doesn't get picked for games, he gets told off more easily, and no one seems to listen to him the same way they used to. This book is funny and easy to read, but it also makes you think. It helps

you understand what it might feel like to be treated unfairly just because of whether you're a boy or a girl. It shows that everyone should be treated the same, no matter what they wear or what gender they are. Years 3 and 4 have used extracts from this book for reading comprehensions, so we're sure that they would love to know what

happens in the rest of the story.

Key Stage 2 Years 5 and 6

This half term we have been learning about many new things. Within our science, we've been developing our knowledge as physicists when we have been learning more about different forces. As part of our learning, we've been learning about gravity and air resistance. We're looking forward to working scientifically to explore our understanding and prove (or disprove) different theories.



Within our art, we have been exploring textiles. We have really enjoyed exploring our own personal style when we designed our perfect outfit incorporating our batik print design. We enjoyed practising with the batik, and we can't wait to see how our final designs turn out after half term.






Within our geography work, we've furthered our knowledge of the United Kingdom and its regions. We enjoyed exploring lots of different maps with a variety of scales, but we found the counties of the United Kingdom and the Ordnance Survey maps some of the trickiest to read. When exploring the Ordnance Survey maps, we created 6 figure grid references – this was really tricky. Within year 5, the children have been exploring film making within their computing lessons. The children have been recording video, editing this and creating a film to promote our Summer Garden Party. Within our PSHE, we've been learning about community and what it means to belong. Within year 5, we've explored how this links to our environment. Within year 6, we explored how this links to respect and ways to promote diversity.








For the final half term of the year, we're looking forward to learning about many new things. Within our science, we will be continuing our learning as physicists. As part of our learning, we'll be exploring water resistance and continuing our scientific investigations. We'll be completing our final designs in art for our fabric sample. We can't wait for all our our ideas to come together in a final piece. Within our history work, we'll be learning about the Roman Empire and its impact on Britain. We'll be learning about many of the things they created and used, that we still use today. Within year 5, the children will be developing their knowledge within RE, and they'll be learning about key beliefs within Christianity. Within our DT lessons, we'll be exploring structures, and we will be designing and creating our own wooden structures – maybe you'll find some for sale at the garden party. Within our PSHE lessons, we will be learning about money, how to manage this and how to save. We'll also be recapping the key areas of learning throughout the year. Our year 6 children will be developing their computing knowledge within information technology, where they'll be exploring word processing, presenting and developing databases within a variety of different software. They'll also be furthering their learning within computer science as they use Kodu game lab to program different games. We're really looking forward to welcoming you to our garden party later in the term, and our year 6 children are looking forward to writing, practising and performing their final concert (Leavers' Concert) at Priory Lane Community School.


