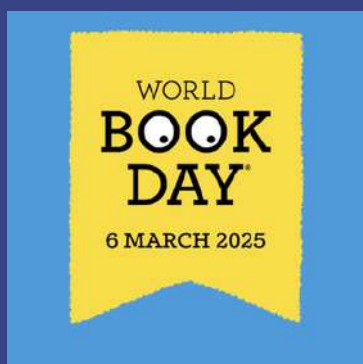

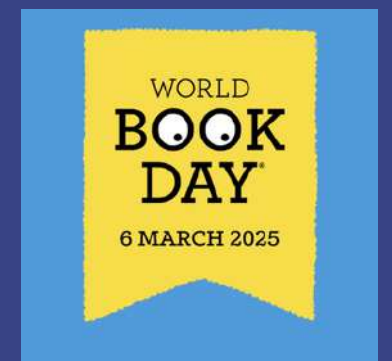

World Book day 2026

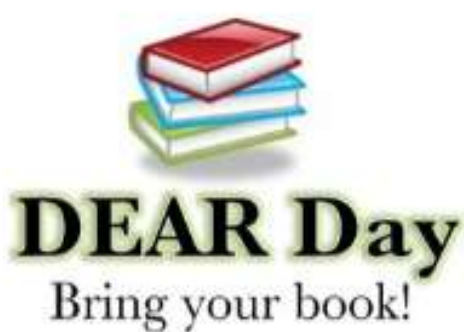
We're looking forward to celebrating World Book Day again in school on **Thursday 5th March**.

Please bring your spoons to your class on World Book Day.

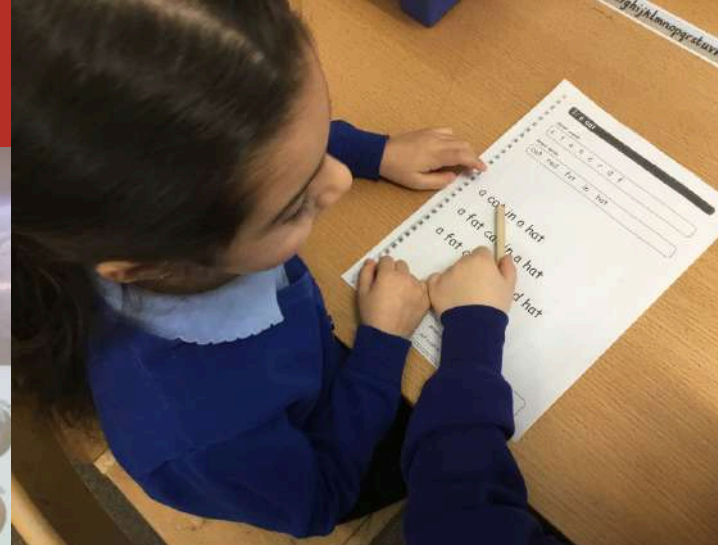

Early Years Foundation Stage

What a busy half term we have had! We started our topic 'Toys through Time' by looking at our teachers' childhood toys and photographs. North Lincolnshire Museum have been very kind and lent us some toys from their collection too. These were a lot older than Miss Lyon's and Miss Chick's toys. They included a cup and ball and rocking horse. We explored how they moved, such as if they needed to be pushed or pulled.

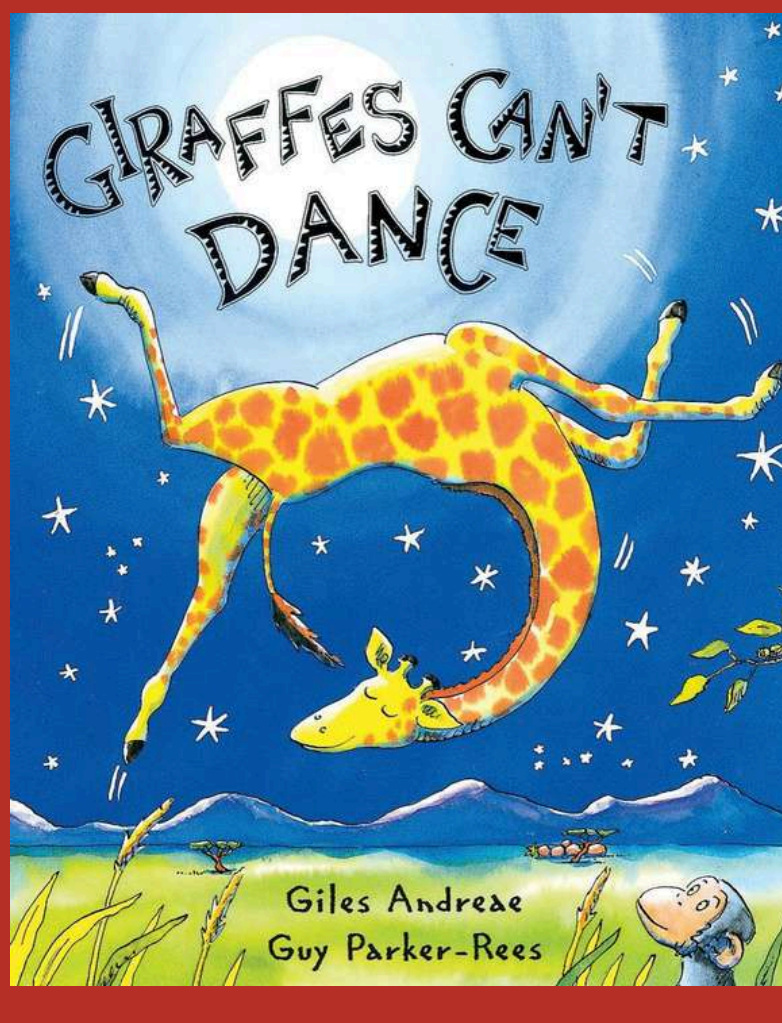
We have read several stories about old toys, including Threadbear by Mick Inkpen and Old Bear by Jane Hissey. Each week we have used our 'Fred talk' skills to write words and captions linked to the books. Some of us have started using full stops too! One of our favourite stories was 'The Sea Saw' by Tom Percival. We made props to retell the story, including a large train which seated two children.



We have continued to learn about numbers in our maths lessons. We have started to identify doubles and odd and even numbers. Our ordering skills have improved this half term, and we can identify missing numbers in a sequence. Number formation will continue to be a focus next half term, as we are still finding certain numbers a little tricky!

Over the term we have carried out several scientific experiments, exploring floating and sinking and magnets. We had great fun learning about shadows and making our very own shadow puppets. As part of our Jigsaw PHSE sessions, we have been talking about our dreams and goals and what we need to do to achieve these.

Going to the hall on a Wednesday morning is definitely a highlight of our week. However, gymnastics has been very challenging this half term, especially using our core muscles to roll. We have balanced and moved across different apparatus, putting together routines to show our skills. We especially enjoyed the recent Silent Disco and the teachers were very impressed with our moves! After half term we will be learning about a country far away - Kenya. We will be learning about the similarities and differences between the two countries, including the animals, music, food and dancing. We are going to be making African things to sell to raise money for Comic Relief too. In art, we are going to explore textiles, weaving and threading different materials.



Our recommended read is Giraffes Can't Dance by Giles Andreae is a beloved, rhyming picture book about Gerald, a tall giraffe who wants to dance at the Jungle Dance but is mocked by other animals due to his clumsy knees. With encouragement from a cricket, he discovers his own unique, rhythmic style, proving that everyone can dance to their own tune.

Watch out for a Giraffes Can't Dance Costume on World Book Day.

Year 1

Another fun-filled half term for the Penguins! It is wonderful to see how confident, mature and resilient the children have become at this half-way point of the year. I am really proud of them all.

In English, the children have produced wonderful writing centred on 'The Lion Inside'. The children loved the unexpected twist at the end.

Next half term, we will be using 'Beegu' by Alexis Deacon to inspire our writing. This is about a friendly creature who ends up on Planet Earth.

We have all enjoyed our 'Sculpture and 3D: Paper Play' topic in Art. We began looking at different sculptures and then using different techniques to create our own. One of my personal highlights of this topic was the 'Tree of Life' inspired artwork the children produced. I know that the children have loved creating their own 'Maman' spider sculptures.

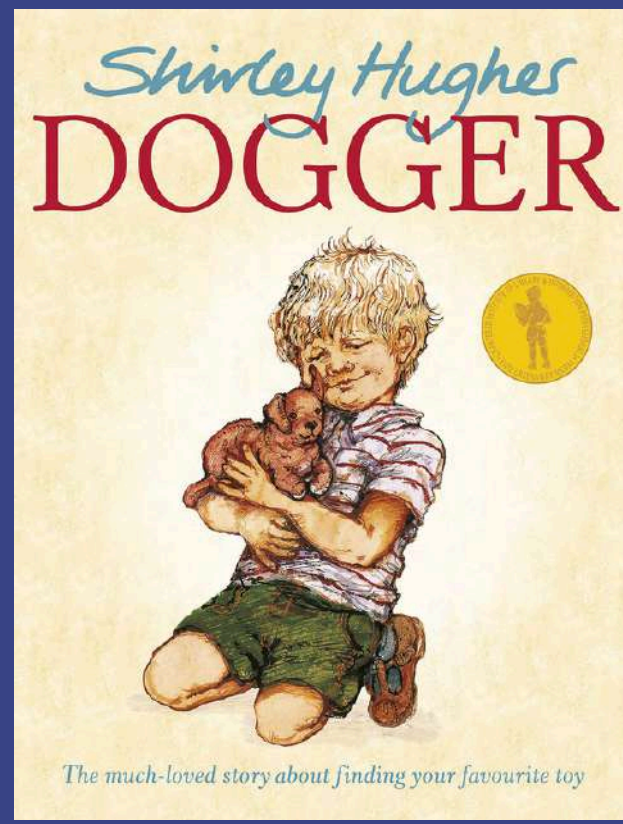
Looking ahead to the next half term, we are staying with Geography and our focus for this half term will 'Be the Seaside'. In our Design Technology lessons, we are going to be making our own textile puppets.

The children thoroughly enjoyed participating in our Silent Disco, there were lots of great dancing and huge smiles.

My recommended read for next half term is the much-loved Shirley Hughes story 'Dogger'. This is a heartwarming book about a boy who loses his favourite toy, and how his family come together to help him get it back again.

Year 2



We are incredibly proud of Year 2 Dolphins and all the hard work they have been doing this term. The children have shown fantastic enthusiasm across the curriculum and continue to impress us with their curiosity, creativity, and determination.

In Science, the children have been learning about microhabitats around the school grounds. They explored where living things can be found and what they need to survive. A real highlight was creating our own wormery in the classroom, which the children have loved observing and discussing. We have also explored habitats around the world, focusing on the Arctic and the Sahara. Desert, and learned how animals and plants adapt to different environments.

In Design and Technology, the children designed and created a Ferris wheel using mechanisms. They explored a range of materials, thinking carefully about strength and structure, and worked hard to ensure their designs were stable and could move successfully. The children showed excellent teamwork and problem-solving skills.

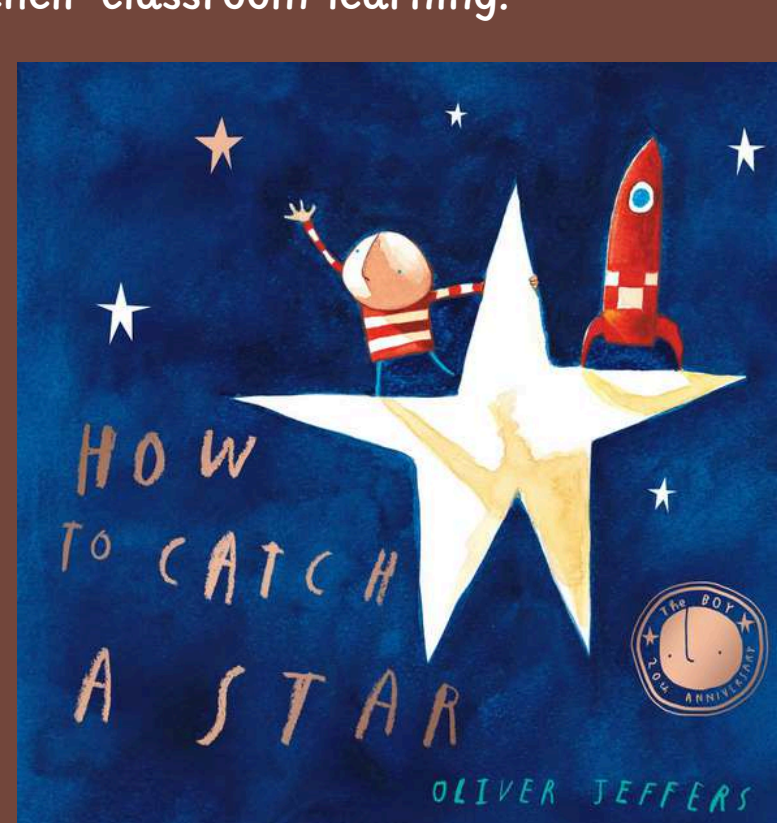


During PSHE, the children have been thinking about their dreams and goals. They shared their ideas confidently and showed just how ambitious they are. It has been wonderful to see them encouraging one another and celebrating big aspirations. In Writing, the children have been learning how to use tense correctly and have been practising writing exclamation sentences and question sentences. They are becoming increasingly confident writers and are enjoying adding excitement and interest to their work.

Next half term, we will be returning to our Geography learning. The children will be learning all about what life is like in Kenya and will be comparing Kenya to the United Kingdom. We will explore similarities and differences, including weather, homes, schools, and daily life.

In Art, the children will be exploring paint and colour. They will experiment with different techniques and colour mixing to create a fantastic final piece of artwork.

In Science, we will be continuing our learning about animals, focusing on food chains and exploring what animals eat. The children will learn how animals depend on one another for survival, and how energy moves through a food chain. We will deepen this learning during our exciting school trip to Yorkshire Wildlife Park, where the children will have the opportunity to observe animals in real-life habitats and make links to their classroom learning.



Our recommended read for this half term is How to Catch a Star by Oliver Jeffers.

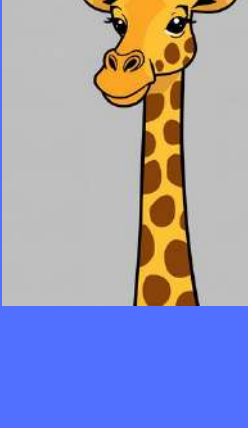
This beautiful story follows a young boy who dreams of having a star of his very own. He tries many different and imaginative ways to catch one, showing determination and creativity along the way. When things do not go as planned, the boy learns that sometimes dreams can come true in unexpected ways.

This is a wonderful book for Year 2 as it encourages imagination, perseverance, and hope. The gentle illustrations support children's understanding of the story, while the simple yet thoughtful text makes it ideal for developing comprehension and discussion skills. It also links nicely to our PSHE learning about dreams and goals.

Thank you for your continued support. We are very proud of everything Year 2 Dolphins have achieved and are looking forward to another exciting half term of learning together.

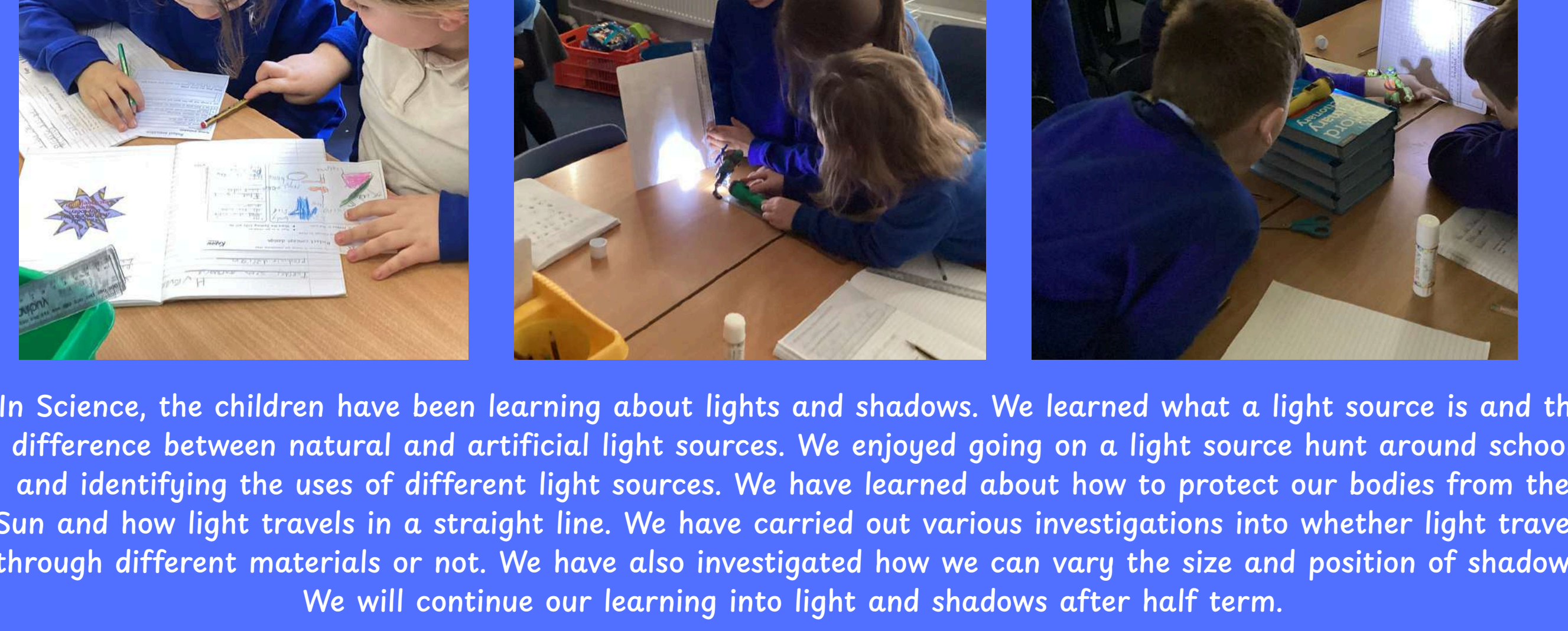

Year 3



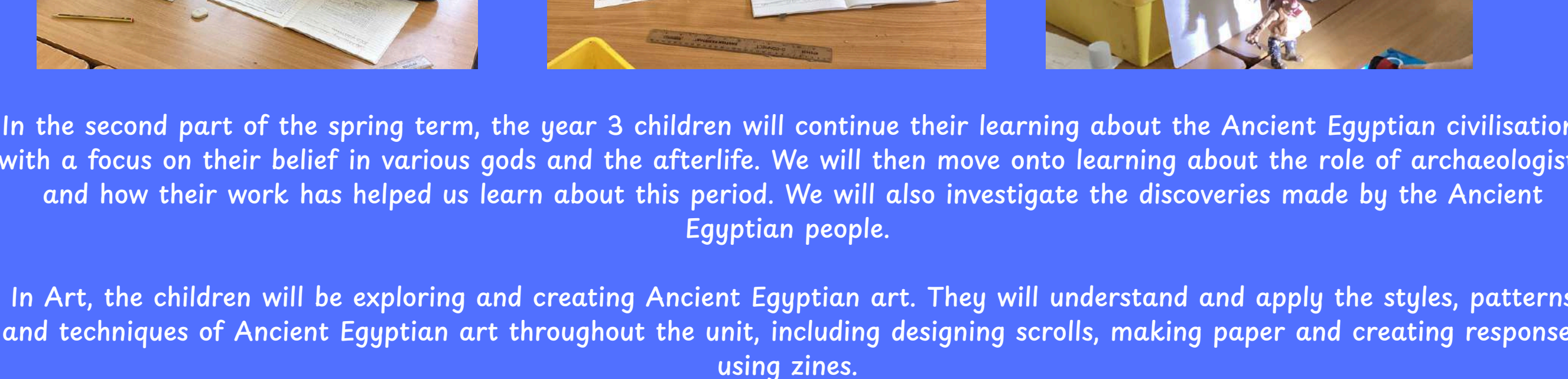
The year 3 children have made a great start to the spring term. In History, the children have been using evidence to learn about the Ancient Egyptian society. We have learned about the importance of the River Nile and how it was essential to daily life. We have investigated the lives of various pharaohs, including Tutankhamun and Cleopatra. We enjoyed learning about the Pyramids of Giza and using digital maps to look at their positions and their size. We have also looked at the hierarchy of society in Ancient Egypt, and we considered which role we would want to hold if we lived in those times. We will continue our learning into the Ancient Egyptian civilisation after half term.

In DT, the children have been investigating wearable technology. The children's task was to design a piece of wearable technology for a child to wear so that they can be seen when walking home in the dark. We were given design criteria, which we aimed to achieve. We initially designed our product to be suitable for the user. We then used computers to programme a Micro: bit to be incorporated in the product in order to make LED lights flash. We used computer-aided design on the programme Sketchpad to create point-of-sale badges to promote our product, and finally we peer evaluated our product against the design criteria. We were so impressed with the ideas that the children developed and their ability to use the new computer software successfully.



In Science, the children have been learning about lights and shadows. We learned what a light source is and the difference between natural and artificial light sources. We enjoyed going on a light source hunt around school and identifying the uses of different light sources. We have learned about how to protect our bodies from the Sun and how light travels in a straight line. We have carried out various investigations into whether light travels through different materials or not. We have also investigated how we can vary the size and position of shadows. We will continue our learning into light and shadows after half term.

In PSHE, the children have been learning about Dreams and Goals. We have considered what our dreams and goals might be for our futures and what we will need to do in order to be able to achieve them. We have worked well in pairs to design gardens of dreams and goals, and have thought about how these could help people within our community. Our final designs are fantastic and are displayed in our class floor book.



In the second part of the spring term, the year 3 children will continue their learning about the Ancient Egyptian civilisation, with a focus on their belief in various gods and the afterlife. We will then move onto learning about the role of archaeologists and how their work has helped us learn about this period. We will also investigate the discoveries made by the Ancient Egyptian people.

In Art, the children will be exploring and creating Ancient Egyptian art. They will understand and apply the styles, patterns and techniques of Ancient Egyptian art throughout the unit, including designing scrolls, making paper and creating responses using zines.

In Science, we will continue our learning into light and shadows. We will investigate and create shadow puppets and investigate which materials reflect light. We will also find out more about what mirrors do to light and use these to see if we can see around corners.

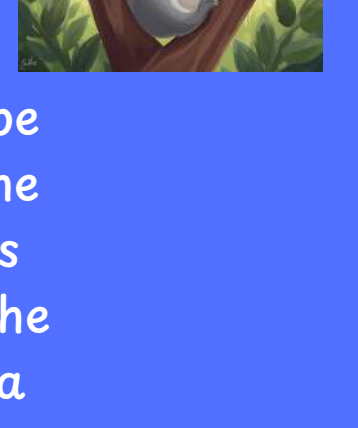
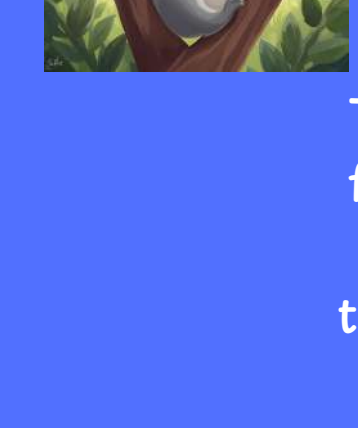
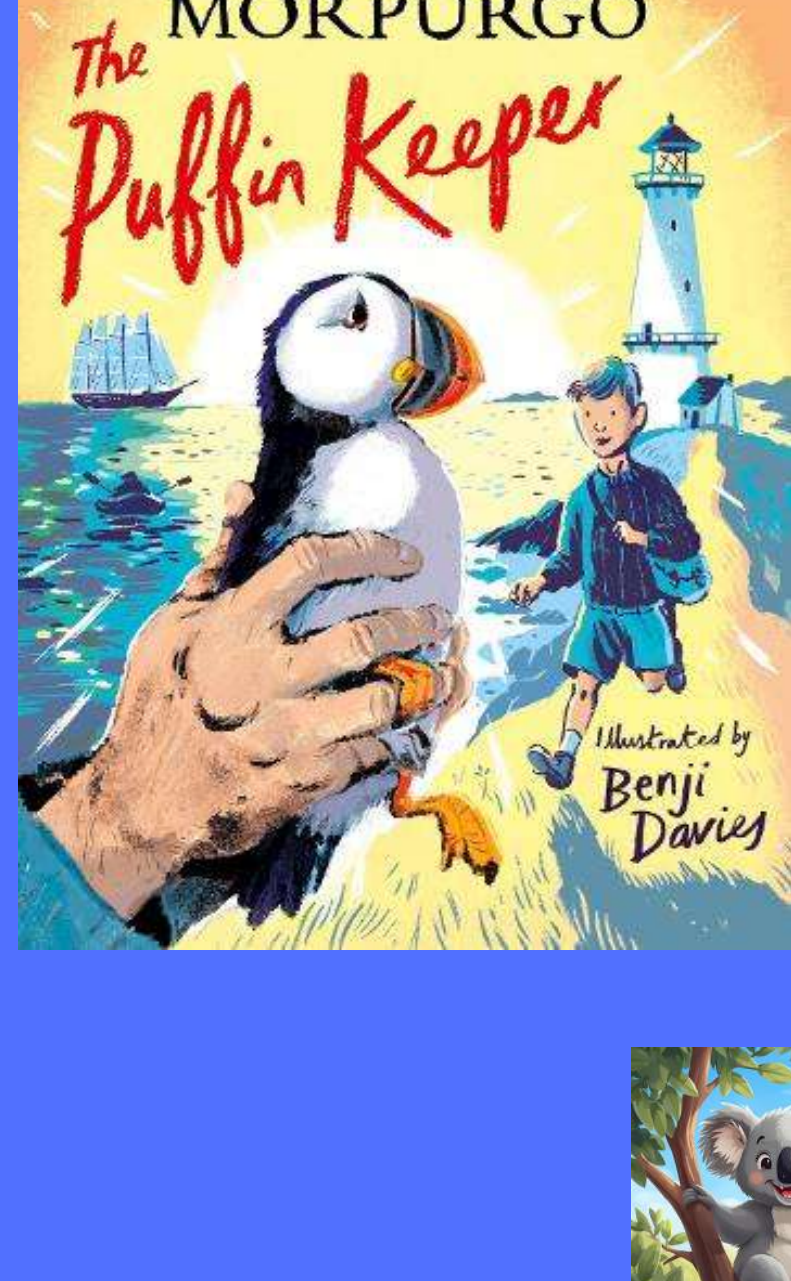
Our recommended read is *The Puffin Keeper* by Michael Morpurgo.

It was Benjamin Postlethwaite's job all his long life to make sure the light shone brightly high up in the lighthouse on Puffin Island. Not once in all his years as the lighthouse keeper had he ever let his light go out. But sometimes even the brightest light on a lighthouse cannot save a ship.

This is a story of a life-changing friendship, a lost puffin and a lonely artist. It's the story of an entire lifetime, and how one event can change a life forever.

In our writing lessons, we will be using another book by Michael Morpurgo to inspire our writing throughout the term.

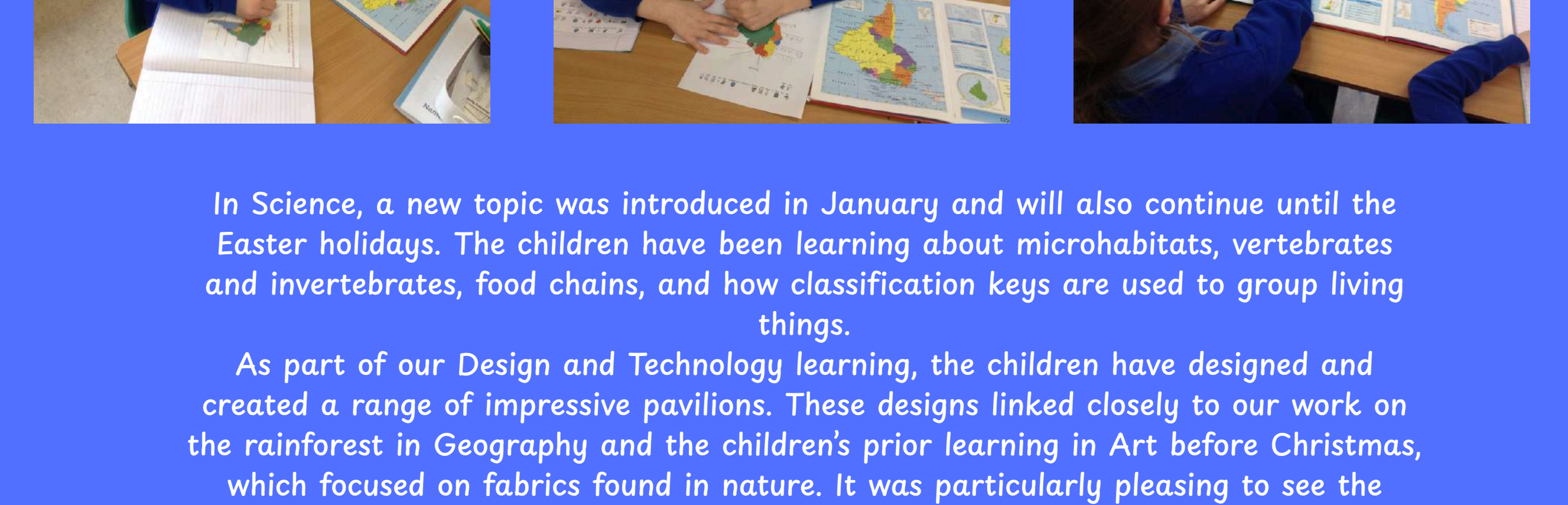

Year 4

The Koalas class has enjoyed a busy and engaging half term. Our key text, *Escape from Pompeii*, has been a particular highlight. The children have learned about the historical eruption of Mount Vesuvius and followed the journey of two children as they escaped the disaster and reached safety. After exploring the text in depth, the children produced thoughtful and detailed retellings of the story, demonstrating a strong use of descriptive and ambitious vocabulary.

This half term, we also began our Geography topic, which will continue until Easter. Our focus is South America, with particular attention given to the rainforest. The children have learned about rainforest climates, the animals that inhabit these environments, and the different layers of the rainforest. They are very much looking forward to sharing their learning with you during our class assembly after half term, which will focus on this topic. The children will be bringing their lines home shortly; further information will follow.

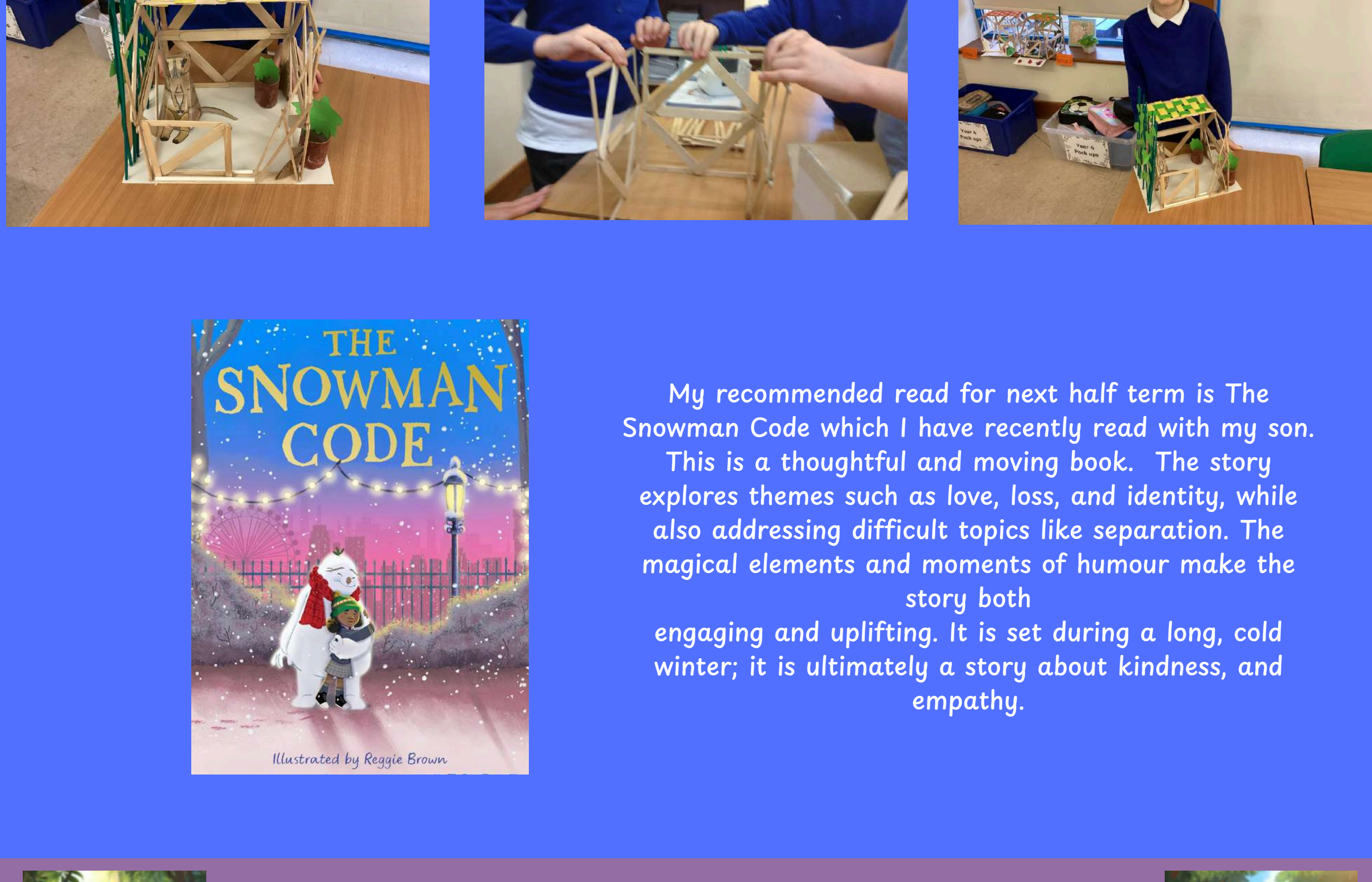


In Science, a new topic was introduced in January and will also continue until the Easter holidays. The children have been learning about microhabitats, vertebrates and invertebrates, food chains, and how classification keys are used to group living things.

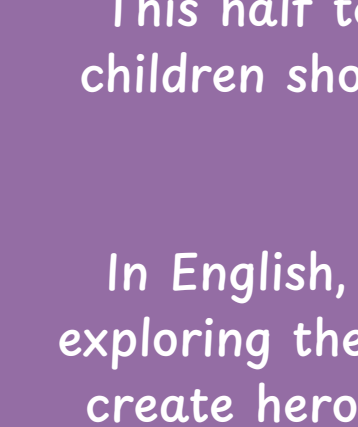
As part of our Design and Technology learning, the children have designed and created a range of impressive pavilions. These designs linked closely to our work on the rainforest in Geography and the children's prior learning in Art before Christmas, which focused on fabrics found in nature. It was particularly pleasing to see the children working collaboratively in small groups, with each child taking on a specific role and contributing positively to the team.

Finally, please note a change to our P.E. timetable for next half term. P.E. lessons will now take place on Mondays and Fridays. I hope you all enjoy a restful and enjoyable break, and I look forward to welcoming the children back next half term.

My recommended read for next half term is *The Snowman Code* which I have recently read with my son. This is a thoughtful and moving book. The story explores themes such as love, loss, and identity, while also addressing difficult topics like separation. The magical elements and moments of humour make the story both engaging and uplifting. It is set during a long, cold winter; it is ultimately a story about kindness and empathy.

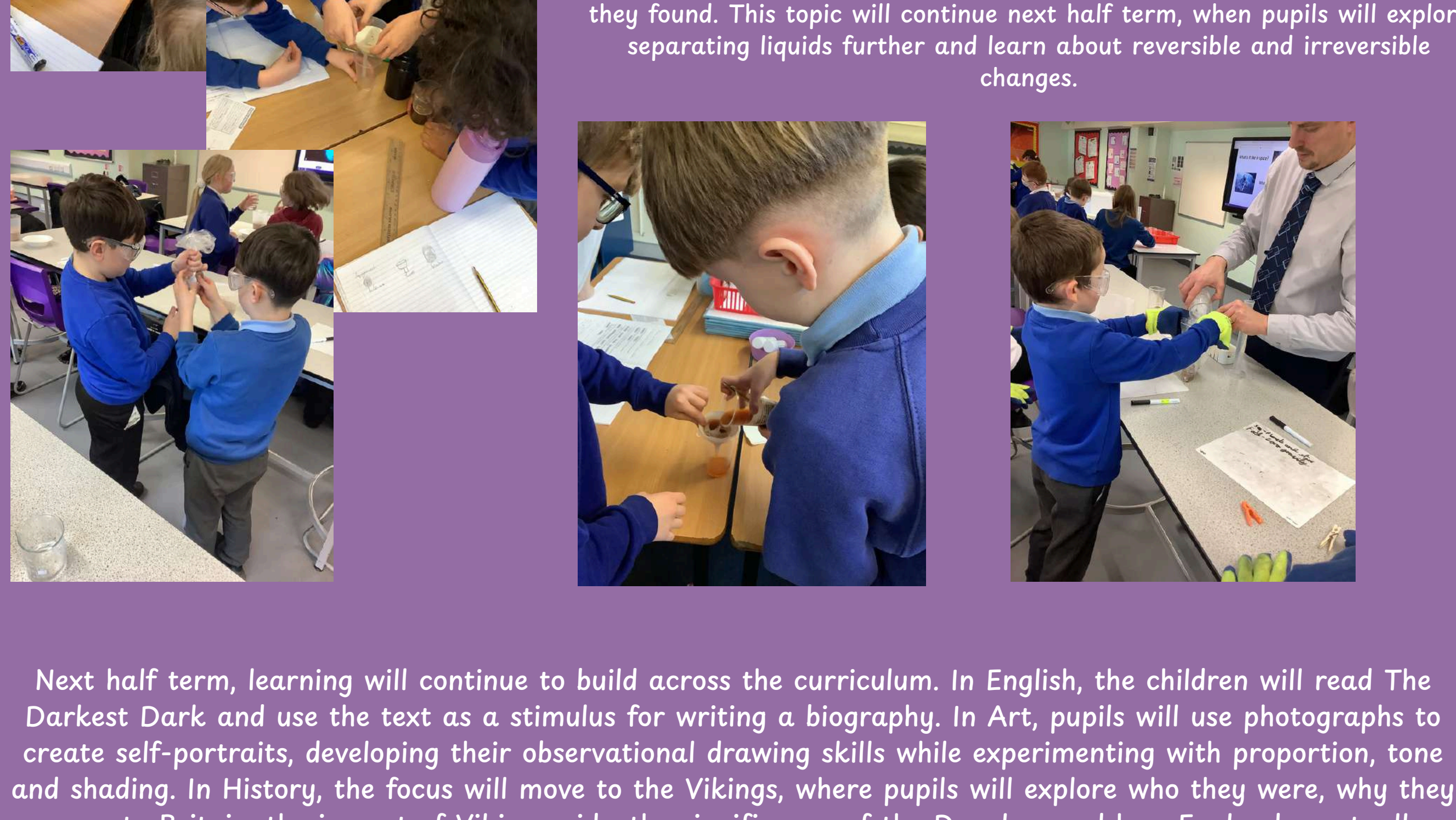


Year 5

This half term has been a busy and productive one, with the children showing enthusiasm and creativity across all areas of the curriculum.

In English, the children studied *Arthur and the Golden Rope*, exploring the key features of myths. They analysed how authors create heroic characters and exciting settings before planning and writing their own original myths. Throughout the unit, pupils worked on developing descriptive vocabulary, expanding sentences using relative clauses and organising their writing into clear, engaging paragraphs.

In DT, the focus was on understanding gears and pulleys. The children explored how these mechanisms work, how they transfer movement, and where they are used in everyday machines. After investigating different examples, they designed and created their own working models and then applied their learning to a creative project, designing an eco-gadget bike that used mechanical systems to support environmentally friendly ideas.



In History, the children learned about the Anglo-Saxons and the Scots, investigating who they were, where they came from and how they ruled different parts of Britain. They explored what archaeological and historical evidence tells us about their daily lives, including homes, jobs, beliefs and communities, helping them to build a clearer understanding of early British history.

In Science, the focus was on materials and their properties. Pupils investigated whether materials are magnetic, whether they are soluble or insoluble, and how mixtures can be separated using processes such as filtering and evaporation. They carried out practical investigations, recorded their observations carefully and used scientific vocabulary to explain what they found. This topic will continue next half term, when pupils will explore separating liquids further and learn about reversible and irreversible changes.

Next half term, learning will continue to build across the curriculum. In English, the children will read *The Darkest Dark* and use the text as a stimulus for writing a biography. In Art, pupils will use photographs to create self-portraits, developing their observational drawing skills while experimenting with proportion, tone and shading. In History, the focus will move to the Vikings, where pupils will explore who they were, why they came to Britain, the impact of Viking raids, the significance of the Danelaw and how England eventually became united under one rule.

Our recommended read is *Skellig* by David Almond

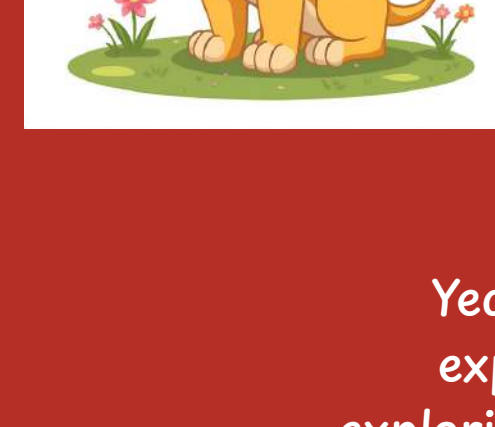
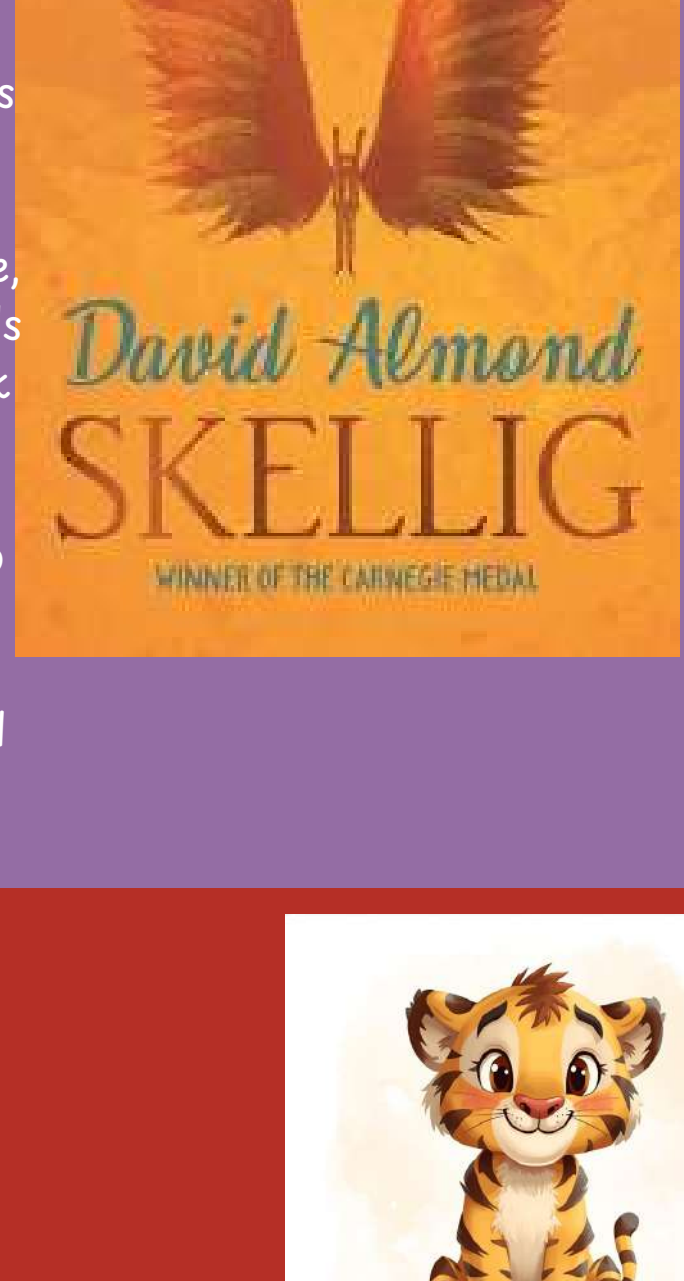
The bestselling story about love, loss and hope that launched David Almond as one of the best children's writers of today. Winner of the Carnegie Medal and the Whitbread children's book of the Year Award.

When a move to a new house coincides with his and his certain's illness, Michael's world seems suddenly lonely and uncertain.

Then, one Sunday afternoon, he stumbles into the old, ramshackle garage of his new home, and finds something magical. A strange creature - part owl, part angel, a being who needs Michael's help if he is to survive. With his new friend Mina, Michael nourishes Skellig back to health, while his baby sister languishes in the hospital.

But Skellig is far more than he at first appears, and as he helps Michael breathe life into his tiny sister, Michael's world changes for ever . . .

Skellig won the Carnegie Medal and the Whitbread Children's Book Award. David Almond is also winner of the 2010 Hans Christian Andersen award.



Year 6

Year 6 have had a fantastic term filled with exciting and enriching learning experiences across the curriculum. In History, they have thoroughly enjoyed exploring World War I, developing their understanding of the causes of the war and the impact it had on people's lives. Next term, they will be learning about World War II and its impact on Britain.

In Science, pupils have been investigating adaptation and inheritance, discovering how animals and plants evolve to suit their environments and how characteristics are passed from one generation to the next. In Art, the children have been learning about one-point perspective and are using this technique to create their own impressive pieces of street art, demonstrating great creativity and skill. The children will be completing this work next term and up scaling their designs.



Alongside this, Year 6 have been working incredibly hard in Maths, Writing and Reading as they prepare for their SATs. They have shown determination and maturity in their approach to their work, and we are very proud of their positive attitudes. This term, the children have also enjoyed a visit from a cricket expert, who helped them to develop their batting, bowling and fielding skills.

Next term we will be continuing to prepare the children for their SATs and exploring the theory of evolution, extinction and how we can save endangered animals.



Our recommended read is *The Machine Gunners* by Robert Westall. *The Machine Gunners* is Robert Westall's gripping first novel for children set during World War Two and winner of the Carnegie Medal. I
